What is the PE and Sports Premium?

The government has provided £450 million over the last four academic years (2013/14, 2014/15, 2015/16 and 2016/17) to primary schools to help them improve the quality and teaching of PE and to develop the sporting opportunities for extra-curricular activities and competitive sports for all children.

The funding was jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health, and Culture, Media and Sport and our school received £16,000 plus an extra £10 per pupil for this academic year.

At Larkswood received £21,670 in the academic year 2017-2018. Schools spent the sports premium on improving and developing their provision of PE and sport, but had the flexibility to choose how they did this.

What we are using the PE and Sports Premium for

At Lime Academy Larkswood, and due to the success of our allocation and budgeting, we continued to commit to ensuring our children to understand and experience the importance of being active, having a healthy lifestyle and enjoy sports and games activities.

In 2017/18 we continued to invest in the following as the impact it has had was greatly beneficial for the children, staff and the whole school community:

- Head of Primary PE to worked alongside class teachers to develop the confidence, enthusiasm and ability to teach PE, review and assess the standard of teaching of PE in the school and to provide opportunities for all children to access and to participate in sports, both for enjoyment and competitively. In addition, the Head of Primary PE provided training for all newly qualified teachers within the school and trainee teachers across the FIPC teacher training college.
- Engaged all children in intra and inter school competitions in the throughout the academic year this included cover for teachers taking children to events/competitions, for any possible transport costs and for the cost of using midday assistants to accompany children to events/competitions in adherence to the school's safeguarding protocols.
- Paid for support from the local schools' sports network (Waltham Forest School Sports Network) to enable children to take part in competitive sports both for KS1 and KS2.
- Purchase of PE resources (equipment, schemes of work etc.) to enable all children to have a wider opportunity to experience different types of sports.
- Encouraged all members of staff to help run or to organise a club to engage target children thus extending the range of extra-curricular activities for all children.
- Identified and developed young sports leaders to act as role models, to organise activities for younger children and to support in the development of skills learnt of each individual.
- Linked with local clubs and inviting specialist sports coaches into school specific clubs identified in the local area or within close proximity to target children of a particular talent and/or ability.

In addition, we will invest the money into ongoing CPD for the Head of Primary PE and other members of staff – this is to build on and development the good/outstanding practice of PE within the school.
